In the 17th and 18th century, many Friends were imprisoned for their faith. That incarceration led to early Quaker efforts at prison reform. Philadelphia Friends created a Fund for Sufferings, still active today, to alleviate financial hardships resulting from Quaker acts of conscience.

This program will explore issues of self-determination, freedom, justice and reform, and will examine past and present efforts to create a fairer and more efficient criminal justice system, highlighted by New Jersey's 2014 decision to reform the monetary bail system.
