Lots of good programs for adults and kids are planned. Registration is light so far, but they get more in September, and walk-ins. There is good participation from Haddonfield Quarter, thanks to Linda Lotz (their coordinator). Registration forms are on the Salem Quarter web site.

PYM: Bob Horvay

The new 2018 Faith and Practice has been published. A discount is available for orders for \$100 from the publisher. The next Continuing Session will be November 3 at the Arch Street Meetinghouse. The PYM Nominating Committee is looking for a clerk of PYM, and a Recording Clerk.

Arch Street Meeting is looking for people to act as guides (docents) and has offered to come to monthly meetings to talk about interpreting Quaker Meetinghouses. Mickleton is considering inviting Mullica Hill and Woodbury to meet at Mickleton Meeting. The discussion may benefit our own historical outreach to our meetinghouses including LAC.

Quaker Day will be October 7 this year. Should we have open houses in our own meeting? Publicize in local papers? Friends suggested that Jared Valdez could prepare press releases. Steering Committee will consider this.

Marketing Communications Mike Ayars reporting for Jared Valdez

Jared reported that 145 unique people opened our Septem-

ber e-bulletin, which was opened a total of 230 times, showing that many people go back to open it up multiple times. This is positive news, indicating that interest in Salem Quarter's electronic communications is growing. Our e-mail list has 374 people. That's a 39% open rate: the industry average for a church is 25%. Our August e-bulletin was opened by 121 unique people.

Update on new editor: we continue to search for a new editor to organize the submissions we get. Carleton Crispin is interested in assisting a new editor. Jim Murphy expressed interest and he will talk with Tom Etherington.

Old Business:

Incorporation status: Jack Mahon is working on tax exemption paperwork. Mickelton and Seaville are incorporated. Friends Foundation is as well.

Additional Announcements - Around the Quarter:

Greenwich: They are moving back to Upper Meetinghouse on October 1.

Mickleton: They collected back-to-school backpacks.

Salem: They held Meeting for Worship at the 1756 Alloways Creek Meetinghouse in August. Two memorial services are scheduled: Becky Shapiro on September 22 and Jean Whitaker (Suzanne Culver's mother) on September 30.

Seaville: Sewing machines and fabrics have been collected and sent to Syria. There is a special need for walkers and crutches and Medical equipment is needed. They made cloth bags for the food pantry next door. They are also collecting back-to-school supplies.

Woodstown: They are finalizing the Music at Friends schedule for this fall and next spring. We no longer hold the Ten Thousand Villages Festival Sale: it has been discontinued by Ten Thousand Villages. Woodstown serves and sells Fair Trade coffee and tea on the Friday night of the Woodstown by Candlelight tour, and continues to host music that evening.

Worship & Ministry Committee

The Salem Quarter Worship & Ministry Committee met on Friday, September 7, 2018 at Mullica Hill Meeting, with eight Friends from four meetings in attendance. We began with worship and considered the need for a new clerk of Worship & Ministry, following the passing of Becky Shapiro. We talked about what Becky had brought to our committee \sim nurturing the depth and richness of our worship. We considered the multiple roles Becky had filled (leading our time together with sensitivity for the needs of worship, taking minutes of meetings, attending quarterly meetings, committee communications, making arrangements for workshops and projects and following up on them, etc.) We decided to try splitting the large amount of work among two or three positions (presiding clerk, recording clerk, and corresponding clerk). Christine Cameron agreed to serve as recording clerk. The presiding clerk's position will be temporarily filled with alternate committee members on a rotating basis, until a Friend is led to offer to serve in the presiding clerk's role.

We talked about some of the projects the committee has brought to the Quarter previously. We discussed further the idea of an afternoon workshop inspired by the Pendle Hill pamphlet, "Welcome to Meeting for Worship," possibly to be held in early November, which would be facilitated by Francisco Burgos, Director of Education at Pendle Hill. Vocal ministry, its discernment and practice would be one focus of the discussion. Friends would share "how we worship," learning from each other's meetings ways to deepen the connection to spirit, and to each other.

Other items carried forward from our last meeting were discussed. A workshop series led by Marcelle Martin, using her latest book "Our Life is Love" as a "one book, one quarter" study is still planned for 2019. Tom Etherington will contact Marcelle to find out a timeframe for the program. Connections are still being made towards prison ministry, taking on writing letters to a prisoner, and supporting the work of Mary Waddington.

We spoke about our Worship & Ministry Committee's work for the Quarter, and the importance of simply listening, of paying attention to Spirit, of giving time to that of the Divine within us.

We discussed the need for Quarterly Meeting to bring forward a Memorial Minute for Becky Shapiro. We shared our thoughts and memories of Becky ~ the immeasurable amount of work she did for the Ouarter; her dedication to communication with each other and with Spirit; her ability to clarify and put into simple words the ideas and thoughts of those present at Meetings for Worship with Attention to Business; her patient listening, unhurried attitude; her celebration of the sweet tastes of life, sharing the bounty of baked goods made by Becky together with her husband Michael and talking of family recipes and the memories and stories to go with them; how she never minded sharing her time with people, didn't complain, was cheerful and loving; and about the remarkable partnership shared by Becky and Michael; how she "got the job done"; how she was a treasured Friend (big F and small); how much her presence is still felt; how very much she will be missed.

We closed in worship, and will meet again on Friday, December 7 at 3:00 p.m. at Mullica Hill Meeting.

Friends School Mullica Hill Announces New Board Clerk



Salem Quarter Indian Affairs Committee Quarterly Report 8th day, Ninth month, 2018

"As long as the sun shines and the rivers run, our hearts are bound to yours."

We are grateful for the place of welcome by committee member Lois Dinshah, host of our most recent meeting in August; we are reminded of Friends' foundational practices, meeting in one another's homes for worship and business. For us this includes recognition of the Lenape homeland, for Fenwick's treating with the Lenape Peoples that we are blessed with this intentional community of Salem Quarter Friends.

Having been asked by Nanticoke-Lenape Tribal Chief, Mark Gould, to lift a message, we discussed the importance of Indigenous sovereignty, self-identity, and the contrasting harms of misappropriations. Striving to withhold judgment of such acts and/ or persons committing such offenses – touting Indigenous sweat lodge practices, using racist mascots, and falsifing Tribal membership - we send light and pray for specific individuals named by several Tribal Nations' Peoples as being forces that dilute authentic conversations and steal authentic space, the voices of true Indigenous cultures. We seek clarity toward righting such acts.

Friends shared articles and books that move their thinking more deeply in daily practices. The articles identify the violence against Native American women and a Methodist mission Native American Boarding School; the two books are written by Robin Wall Kimmerer – *Braiding Sweetgrass* and *Gathering Moss*. We wonder whether Friends might join us in a Book Club style reading of *Braiding Sweetgrass*, with details to come as way opens.

Toward healing our communities, an "atrocity" was named by N-L Council/ Supreme Justice, Pastor J Norwood, posted in the Philadelphia Inquirer. We were called to assist a meeting (within PYM) for repatriation of a skull of an ancestor. The primary voices were introduced, others were asked to refrain from gossip yet pray for resolve. Love, relationship building, and silence guided by the light were simply our tools. We have read in a Native publication that this work was exemplary.

Members of this committee, representing Toward Right Relationship workshop facilitators and PYM's First Contact Reconciliation Collaborative, networked with Young Friends bringing to Annual Sessions the workshop *Re-discovering America: Understanding Colonization.* We were joined by SQ Friend Emily, seasoned in holding the space. Feedback was very positive. Also during Annual Sessions, Thursday am MfBusiness, Emily read the Minute of Religious Service, drafted by Rebecca Shapiro on behalf of SQ Worship and Ministry, approved by this body last Quarterly meeting.

Coming joys include a table at Tri-Quarter, a talk with Downingtown FM, a workshop with Collingswood High School, NJ curriculum modifications, and The (Fall) Gathering weekend at the Cohanzick grounds. We ask that SQ Friends keep the relationship chain strong by being present with one another and sharing the good words, toward propagating the unique ways of SQ Friends. An example of faithful living:

I grew up in Almonesson and attended the Almonesson Methodist Church. Harry Peters was one of my Sunday school teachers as an example of living life faithfully to his beliefs. He wasn't really enthusiastic about attending church. He didn't find much of value in the sermons but he would go every week faithfully. His thinking was that, although he didn't get much from it, God had been good to him and he needed to witness to God's goodness. He figured that someone who needed to go to church might see him go and follow his example and be blessed for having gone. Frankly, when he got to church he would choose a seat behind one of the pillars and take a little nap.

One thing he felt strongly about was that Sunday should be a day of rest and he didn't want to be responsible for anyone else having to work Sunday or having the peace of that day interrupted. Consequently he always checked the gas gauge in his car on Saturday. But Harry would not be the cause of disturbing someone Sunday even though his neighbor didn't care one way or the other.


